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Introduction

What does 'transition' mean?

The word 'transition' means the process of change. For example, a transition could be changing from primary school to secondary school. In a time of transition (or change), some things can be exciting, and other things can be quite worrying. However, **planning** for the transition can make changes much less frightening with the help of other people.

What is this workbook for?

With your transition to secondary school approaching, this workbook is here to help you plan the move to your next school. Your parents/carers, and teachers at your primary school, can also help you complete it.

Some parts of the workbook are here to gather some useful information, some parts will help you think about what you are looking forward to, and some parts will help you make a plan to help with any things you might be worried about.

Everyone has different strengths and worries, so some pages might be more important for you, and some not so much. It is OK to leave these pages blank. Just fill in the pages that have things on them that are important to you.

We hope you find the workbook useful and you enjoy completing the activities that we have set for you.


Key:


In a new school there might be many opportunities to try out things you have never done before, or to learn more about things you are good at.

My biggest worries


Starting new things can be exciting but they can also be quite scary. It is good to investigate what these worries are so that you can plan what to do about them.



School rules



Every school may have different rules. As you get older, there might be new rules to learn about. It is important to remember that school rules are there to make school life better for everyone.

If a school rule is broken there may be consequences (results) that you will need to know about. For some schools, if a rule is broken it may mean that the person who broke the rule is not allowed out at break or lunch time. For other schools, if someone breaks a rule it may mean that that person gets a detention (which could mean that they spend some extra time at school after the normal school day is finished).

There are sometimes ways that you can make things better/fix a situation after a school rule has been broken. Sometimes this might be simple, like saying sorry; other times it may mean that you spend some of your own time fixing something that has been broken.

It might be important to you to check what the rules are at your secondary school so you can start learning them, plan how to follow them, and know what to do if you break them.

Getting to know the staff (teachers) in my new secondary school

In primary school (where you are at school now), you may have one main teacher (usually called your classroom teacher).

You may also have a teaching assistant (TA) who helps out in your classroom, as well as perhaps having other teachers for different lessons like Maths or English.

When children go to secondary school, they will usually have a different teacher for different lessons like Maths, English, Geography, History and lots more. This can be quite exciting but can also be quite scary.





Getting to know my way around my new secondary school



At primary school you will have had a few lessons in a week and you will have learnt which days and what times those lessons happen. For example, English might have been on a Tuesday morning, Maths might have been on a Thursday morning, and PE might have been on a Wednesday afternoon.

At secondary school you will have more lessons to go to, perhaps five or six every day. You will also have a lot more teachers. You will usually have one teacher for each subject/topic (e.g. Maths, Science, Geography). With many more teachers to get used to, you might find the 'secondary school teachers picture board' on page 183 extra helpful.

It is important to check whether your new secondary school has a one- or two-week timetable. If it has a two-week timetable you will also need to remember which week you

need to follow, i.e. the timetable for 'Week 1', or 'Week 2'. It might be *useful to get a calendar* that has all the weeks of a month on one page so you can plan out which weeks you need to follow the 'Week 1' timetable, and which weeks you need to follow the 'Week 2' timetable.

Your new timetable is one of the most important things you will need when you start at your new secondary school.



What else is important to me?

The next section will help you think about anything else that is important to you when planning your transition to your new secondary school.

We have included some things that are important to other children when they transition to secondary school in the next few pages. Just fill in the pages that have things on them that are important to you. We have also left some space for you to add things that we might not have included.



Sensitive spots



Some children can find certain places in their new secondary school quite tricky – their 'sensitive spots'. For example, some children find crowded corridors or the canteen might seem too loud and busy. The toilets might also be a 'sensitive spot' because they might be a bit messy, or just very different to the toilets at home.

'SAFE HAVENS'



It is important to some people to find out where some 'safe havens' might be. These 'safe havens' could be quiet spaces you can go if things are getting too much, you need some time alone, or you want to talk to someone by yourself. Some schools will have special rooms that you can go to for a bit of 'time out'.

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What would I like to share about myself?

Some young people find it helpful to share that they have an autism spectrum disorder (ASD) so that they can get support and help for their needs.

Some children may only share their diagnosis (that they have an ASD) with one other person in private, away from everyone else. Other people might want to tell everyone including their teachers, friends and other people they will meet at their new secondary school.

Managing my first day My first day at secondary school For lots of children the first day of secondary school is very exciting but can also make them quite nervous. Getting started can feel difficult. On the first day, some children find it helpful to get to the new secondary school later, after all the other children have arrived. And some children find it helpful to meet someone that they have met before like a child who was in their primary school too, or a teacher they have met to a previous visit to the new secondary school. It might be important to you to think about what would be most helpful on your first day of secondary school. It might be a good idea to talk to your parents, your primary school teacher(s) and/or your new secondary school teacher(s) and ask what they think might be helpful? 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

Bullying



Bullying is when one person, or a group of people, intentionally behaves in a way that upsets another person. Sometimes this might be *saying* things that are not very nice, or it might be *physically* hurting someone, like hitting or kicking them.

Bullying is always wrong and should never be allowed.



Homework:



Homework is a task children need to do at home. The aim of the homework is to help children fully understand what they have been taught in each lesson.

Some children are excited about getting more homework when they go to their new secondary school. Other children find more homework hard to manage.

At lots of secondary schools, children are given a 'planner' or 'homework diary' to help them organise what homework they have to do, and when they have to finish it by.

It might be important to you to find out what the school rules are about homework. It might also be helpful for you to ask someone from your new secondary school some questions about homework like the examples below:

- How will I know what my homework is?
- How will I know when the homework needs to be finished and handed in?
- How much time should I spend on homework each night?
