## What is Private Fostering?

Private fostering is a private arrangement between a parent and a carer, to look after a child/children under the age of 16 (18 if disabled).

A private foster carer is not a parent or a close relative of the child. It includes cousins, a great aunt or uncle, neighbour, family friend, or a host family (e.g. for boarding school holidays)."

This arrangement would have to be more than 28 days, before being considered as PF arrangement.

Private Foster Carers do not have parental responsobility but can make day to day decisions for the child.

### Why is it important to assess and monitor private fostering arrangements?

Victoria Climbié was cared for by her great-aunt in a private fostering arrangement.

Her tragic death in 2000 exposed serious failures in safeguarding and multi-agency communication.

The Laming Inquiry led to major reforms, including the Children Act 2004 and other updated regulations.

Local authorities now have a statutory duty to:

- Assess private fostering arrangements.
- Visit privately fostered children regularly.

Carers and professionals have a legal duty to notify the local authority if they know or suspect a private fostering arrangement.



#### Potential Signs of Private Fostering

- A child is living with someone other than their parents
- Changes in who collects a child from school
- Lack of parental contact
- Signs of hidden arrangements

#### Private Fostering Situations

Local children living apart from their families

Children from overseas

Child care arrangements

Asylum seekers and refugees

Parents who may be unwell

Children who may be staying with friends for a short time due to family difficulties

Children attending language schools

Children at independent boarding schools who do not return home for holidays
