>> [Key messages from research on child sexual exploitation](#)

Children are sexually abused in many different ways, and in different situations or contexts. One form of this abuse is child sexual exploitation. The definition of child sexual exploitation has changed over time and crosses over into other forms of sexual abuse. It is important that all professionals are informed with the latest and

best evidence to respond to, prevent and disrupt this form of child sexual abuse. Key messages from research on child sexual exploitation recently published by The Centre of Expertise on Child Sexual Abuse ([CSA Centre](#)) brings together the latest relevant research to help professionals respond to the significant number of children and young people who need support right now.

Please note that our Safeguarding in Schools Lead delivers bespoke training on child sexual exploitation and other forms of exploitation / extra familial harm. >> Free “Embrace” support services for children and families affected by serious crime

The Embrace Child Victims of Crime is a national children’s charity that focuses all its time on helping children, young people and families recover from the effects of crime. They have a range of free emotional support, counselling, and advocacy services available across the UK for children and their families affected by domestic abuse and other serious crimes.

National Support

- National funding is available to provide remote emotional support and counselling for children affected by serious crimes, including sexual and domestic abuse.
- Support is delivered online, so children need to be aged 11+ to access.
- Referrals can be submitted by professionals, police, parents and schools.
- Young people should not already be currently supported by Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS). Including on the waiting list to be assessed or access CAMH support.
- Because the support is online and they are a short-term intervention, they must ensure the safety of the young person so unable to support young people who are presenting with suicidal ideation and / or high risk of self-harm.

Criteria for Counselling – Children Affected by Domestic Abuse – To be eligible, children must:

- Be aged 11 to 18.
- Not be in regular, unsupervised contact with the perpetrator of the abuse.

“You Are Enough™” (National)

- Peer support for parents and carers of children affected by sexual abuse, including online harm.
- Provides a safe, professionally facilitated online group in an empathetic environment.

- Referrals can be made by professionals or via self-referral.
