

FGM Definition

The term *"female genital mutilation"* refers to **all**

procedures involving partial or total removal of the

external female genitalia or other injury to the female

genital organs for non-medical reasons.

Types of FGM

Type 1 - WHO

(Clitoridectomy): Where part or all of the clitoris or the hood of it is removed



Flesh removed -UNICEF



Types of FGM

Type 2- WHO (Excision): Where the clitoris and inner lips (labia minora) are removed


Flesh removed -**UNICEF**

Types of FGM

Type 3 – WHO

(Infibulation):

Where the clitoris, inner and outer lips (labia minora/majora) are cut away and the remaining skin is sewn or sealed together to varying degrees



Sewn closed - UNICEF




Type 4 (no image)

All other harmful procedures including:

- Pricking, (making hole with a sharp point)
- Piercing,
- Incision, (a small cut)
- Cauterising, (burning of the skin or flesh with a heated instrument)
- Stretching/pulling,
- Scraping,


Or use of herbs and other substances for tightening.

- Research indicates that over 137,000 women living in England & Wales have undergone FGM.
- Research in 2007 indicated **24,000** girls under 15 years old in the UK have undergone or are at risk of undergoing FGM.
- Newer research from 2014 suggested up to 60,000 girls are now at risk.
- Globally, over 200 million girls and women have undergone FGM.

Female Genital Mutilation Act 2003

CHAPTER 31

The FGM law:

- It is illegal to practice FGM in the UK *
- It is illegal to take a girl abroad for FGM
- It has a penalty of (up to) 14 years imprisonment and/or a fine.

* Applies to England, Wales and Northern Ireland (Scotland has its own law on FGM)



The Serious Crimes Act 2015

- The Act made several changes to the FGM Act 2003 -

Extended Protections

- Introduced 4 new laws:
- 1. Offence of failing to protect girls
- 2. Life-long anonymity for victims in publications
- 3. New 'female genital mutilation protection orders'
- 4. Duty to notify <u>police</u> of FGM cases on girls under 18 within one month (for professionals).
